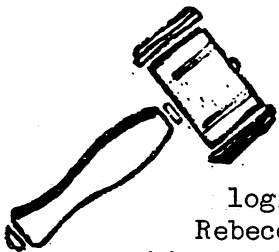

IOWA - The Iowa Department of Public Health has proposed rule changes of Title XVIII to read "Equipment or vital records shall not be physically handled except by the registrar, deputy or authorized personnel". (Ed. note: Stopped by the Scott County Courthouse in Davenport, IA in July and was told that this was decreed by the governor of Iowa; however, for a fee of \$4.00, the clerk was willing to look up any number of names and dates for me, but said the cause of death could not be given. Margaret Ramsdale went to Keokuk, IA in July and was permitted to go in and look at the records.)

MAINE - Fifty-four microfilm reels, providing all birth, marriage and death records in the state during the years 1923 to 1936, with births listed alphabetically by the father's name have been added to the resources of the Maine State Archives. Also, 72 new reels are at hand containing similar records for the years 1937-55, with illegitimate births omitted. There is also a bride's index to marriage records for the period from 1895 to 1955. Formerly there was only a groom's index.

MICHIGAN - A new fee schedule has been placed in effect whereby there will be a charge of \$10.00 for all certified copies of birth, death or marriages. Additional copies are \$3.00.

NEW JERSEY - Charge for a certified copy of a vital record is now \$4.00. Address: Div. of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics, Room 111, City Hall, Newark, NJ 07102.

TEXAS - Charge for a certified copy of a vital record is now \$3.00. The new address is: Texas Dept. of Health, 1100 W. 49th St., Austin, TX 78756.

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MEET ART GRAVES

An article in the Hutchinson News dated 29 September 1904 states that the firm of A.J. Graves; Coal, Feed & Flour at 129 So. Main, Hutchinson, Kansas, will henceforth be known as A.J. Graves & Son. The change in the name of the firm resulted from the birth on the previous day, 28 September 1904, of W.A. (Art) Graves, the only son in a family of eight daughters. His parents were Arthur James Graves (b 1856 NY) and Ruth Ellen Slack (b 1859 IA).

Art attended grade school at the Reno County District #65 school in South Hutchinson, high school at Hutchinson High and college at Kansas State Teachers College in Pittsburg, Kansas.

On the 17th of August, 1930, Art married Doris Griffeth. Doris comes from a large Reno County family and was graduated from Hutchinson High School. Art and Doris have two children: Arthur James Graves, a businessman and rancher of Nacogdoches, Texas; Carol Ann Kaufman, a housewife, mother and nurse of San Jose, California. Both Arthur James and Carol Ann were graduated from Kansas University, Lawrence, Kansas. There are six grandchildren: Five boys and one girl.

Art retired in 1974 after 50 years as a carpenter and builder.

Art says his number one hobby is genealogy, but he is also interested in photography, gardening, lawn tending and woodworking. His Citizens Band 'handle' is "The Woodworker."

He has made a tremendous contribution to The Reno County Genealogical Society by seeing through to publication The Cemetery Records of Reno County, the society's first attempt at publishing a book. His co-chairman on this project was Everett Wells.

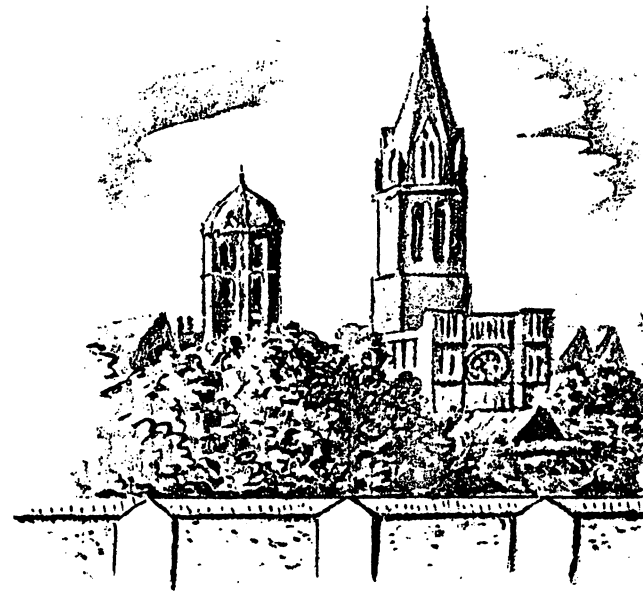

THE WILL OF JOHN COO, of Gestyngthorpe in the diocese of London, England - dated 3 September 1520, probated 14 February 1520. From the book ROBERT COE, His Ancestors and Descendants 1340-1910 by Jay Gardner Bartlett. Published in 1911.

As John Coo was a direct ancestor of Arlene Vincent, RCGS member, and his will is a document of historic interest illustrative of his times, 461 years ago, it is herewith given in full, verbatim et literatim:

In the name of god Amen The iij<sup>th</sup> Day of September the yer of o<sup>r</sup> lord god m<sup>l</sup>v<sup>xx</sup><sup>th</sup> And in the xij<sup>th</sup> yere of the Reigne of o<sup>r</sup> souaigne lord kyng henry the viij<sup>th</sup>, I Johu Coo of Gestyngthorpe in the diocese of london beyng of hole mynde and pfyght remembrance thanked be god make and ordeyne this my testament and last will in maner & fourme folowyng. first I bequeth my Soule unto almyghty god, o<sup>r</sup> blessed lady saint Mary, And to all the holy Company of hebyn. And my body to be buried in the Church of Gestyngthorp aforesaid in the pase bifore mary Magdalene. Also I bequethe to the high Awlter within the said Church of Gestyngthorp for my tythes by me neclygently forgotten vs. Also I bequeth to the wirks in the Church of powles in london xij<sup>d</sup>. Also I bequethe for to haue myn obytte kept yerely ppetually w<sup>in</sup> the church of Gestyngthorp aforesaid thies somes of money underwritten, that is to saye to the 6 year for the tyme beyng for dirige Masse of Requiem and for to reherse my name in the bederolle evy sonday in the yere xij<sup>d</sup>. To the pysshe Clark for the tyme beinge evy yere ij<sup>d</sup>. To the Sexten for the tyme beinge evy yere iiij<sup>d</sup>. To the church wardens for the tyme beyng every yere iiij<sup>d</sup>. To vj pore ffolkys evy yere vj<sup>d</sup>. And for brede and drynke to be distributed evy yere amongs power folkes the said day of myn obite xij<sup>d</sup>. To xij powe folks evy yere on Ester day Whenne they shall receyve o<sup>r</sup> god lorde xij<sup>d</sup>. Also I bequeth to the Makyng of a Tapour of wax weyinge x lb to be sett bifore the Sepulcre of o<sup>r</sup> lord evy yere j lb wax or ells x<sup>d</sup> in redy money. Also I bequethe to an honest preest to synge for my sowle the sowle of Johann my wife and for the soules of our ffrends and all cristen soules by the space of oon yere next after my decease vi<sup>li</sup>. Also I bequethe towards the buyldynge of the Church house of Gestyngthorp aforesaid yf the pysshens wilbe bounden unto myn Executors to ffynyshe yt by a certeyn Day to be lymytted vi<sup>li</sup>. xiiij<sup>d</sup>. And yf they will not be contented so to do that thenne this my gyft to them in that behalf to be utterlye voyde. Also I bequeth to evy of my godchildren now beyng alyve xii<sup>d</sup>. Also I bequeth to xiiij pore folks to be paid evy fryyday by the space of oon hole yere ymmedyatly after my decease to euy of theym 1<sup>d</sup>, of which xiiij powe folks iiij of theym to be dwellars in Waterbelchampe. Also I bequeth for the bying of a marble Stone to be layde upon my grave and for the makyng of a table of Brasse to be Joyned in the same stone wherein I will that the day of myn obyt be graven, lxvi s viij d. Also I bequeth to Johane ffyrmyn my daughter iiij li. Also I bequethe to Agnes Coo and Alys Coo my daughters to eche of theym at their at their Mariags vi li. xiiij sh. iiij d. Also I bequeth to Rose Sewall my Wyffs daughter xx sh. Also I bequeth to John Coo thelder myn sone the profits duryng the yeres and terme whiche I nowe haue to come in suche lands and ten'ts as were somtym William Wards lyeng in Waterbelchampe. Alsoe I bequethe unto Johane my wyff all suche hostylments and stufte of howshold as she brought with her at the tyme of o<sup>r</sup> maryage. furthermore I will that John Coo thelder my Sone shall haue and holde to hym and to the heires males of his body lawfully begotten as well my howse or ten't lyinge in the pysshe of hempsted in the Countie of Essex togyther w<sup>t</sup> my lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp'tennces sett lying & beyng in the pyshe of Water belchmpe in the Countie aforsaid als my pece of Lande lyinge in the pyshe of fynchyngheld in the same Countie. And if the said John Coo thelder my sone w<sup>t</sup>out yssue male of his body lawfully begotten happe to dysceas The[n] I will that all the said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp't.





tences so unto the same John my sone assigned shall hooly remayne to John Coo the yonger my sone And to the heires males of his body lawfully to begotten. [And if John the yonger] happe to decease then I will that all the said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thappurtences shall hooly Remayne unto Thomas Coo my sonne and to the heires males of his body lawfully to be gotten. Also I will that the foresaid John Coo the yong my sone shall have & holde to hym and to the heyres males of his body lawfully to be gotten as well all my lands and ten'ts lying in the pyshe of Gestynghorpe except my ten't called Wyhts ten't togyder w<sup>t</sup> my lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp<sup>r</sup>tences lying in the pyshe of Moche mapuldersted in the said Countie of Essex also my lands and ten'ts lying in the pyshe of olde Sampford in the same Countie. And yf the said John Coo the yonger my sone without Issue male of his body lawfully to be gotten happe to decease thenne I will that all the said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thappurtences so unto the same John Coo the yonger assigned shall hooly remayne to the foresaid John Coo thelder my sone and to the heires males of his body lawfully to be gotten. And yf the same John Coo thelder my sone without yssue male of his body lawfully to be gotten happe to decease, thenne I will that all the said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thappurtences so unto the said John Coo the yonger my sone assigned shall hooly remayne to Thomas Coo my sone and to the heires males of his body lawfully to be gotten. Also I will that Thomas Coo my sone shall have and holde to hym and to the heyres males of his body lawfully to be gotten all my lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp<sup>r</sup>tences lying in the pyshe of halsted in the Countie of Essex aforesaid. And yf the same Thomas Coo my sone without yssue male of his body lawfully to be gotten happe to decease thenne I will that all the said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp<sup>r</sup>tences so unto hym assigned shall hooly Remayne unto the foresaid John Coo thelder my sone to have and holde to hym and to the heyres males of his body lawfully to begotten. And yf the same John Coo thelder my sone without [issue] male of his body lawfully to be gotten happe to decease thenne I will that all the said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp<sup>r</sup>tences unto the said Thomas Coo assigned shall hooly remayne to John Coo the yonger my sone and to the heires males of his body lawfully to be gotten. And yf all my said sonnes without issue males of their bodies lawfully to be gotten happe to decease thenne I will that all my said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp<sup>r</sup>tences as byfore to them and evy of them be assigned shall remayne equally to be devyded amongs their daughters if any shall happe to be, To have and holde to them and their heires for evmore. And yf all my said sonnes w<sup>t</sup>out issue of their bodies lawfully to be gotten happe to decease Thenne I will that the assignes of the Survivor of them shall lawfully sell all the said lands and ten'ts w<sup>t</sup> thapp<sup>r</sup>tences And all the money thereof comyng to dyspose charitably for the soules of me my Wyffe and my said children. Moreov<sup>r</sup> I will that my Executours shall have the ovysight and governance of Thomas Coo my sone untill he come to the age of xxi yere. And they to receyve the yssues and profitts of suche lands and ten'ts as I have gevyn to the same Thomas by this my will unto his said age of xxi yere And thenne to yelde hym Accompt of the same yssues and p<sup>r</sup>fyts deductyng for repacions & Rents resoluts And also the costs and expens for the keping of the same Thomas in the meane tyme. Also I bequethe to Johanne my wif in redy money to be paid by myn executours xx marks sterlinge aver and Besides xi li. vi sh. viii d. which Thomas Sewall her Sone and Rose his wif dothe owe unto me, and also vi marks sterlinge whiche Thomas Peter doth oweth me. Also I bequeth to the saide Johane my wif 6 qters whete & v qters malte. Also yf the said Johane be contentid to abide at my ferme that I now dwell in and ther to helpe and do as she hath doon hederto oone yere next after my decease thenne I will that she shallbe conenyntly founden by myn Executours duryng the same tyme And to have for her lab<sup>r</sup> xx sh. sterling. And the residew of all my goods and Catalls unbequethed I gyve unto John Coo the elder and John Coo the yonger my sonnes for the pformacon of this my testament and last Wyll, Whome I make and ordeyne myn executours. And John Goldyng oon of the kynges awditours in his eschequer to be Supvisour of this my testament and last will to Whome I bequeth for his labor xxvi sh. viii d. sterling.

Theis witnessing Xpofer Rypley, vicor of the pysshe of Gestynghorpe, John Park Willm Tyffyn of Gestynghorpe aforesaid and many others. Dat die & Anno sup.

Probated at Lambeth Feb. 14, 1520, and commission issued to John Coo and John Coo sons of the deceased. (P. C. C., 5 Maynwaryng.)
