#### DEATH

#### CAPTAIN CHARLES A. WISEMAN

The community was shocked to learn, Saturday, of the sudden death of their friend and fellow citizen, Capt. Charles A. Wiseman, which occurred Thursday 26inst., at ARLINGTON, KANSAS. The deceased had resided in Pike county, off and on, since "56" and during this time had endeared himself to a large circle of friends who ever had for him the kindest feelings. In 1872, he married Miss Abbie J. Livensberger, daughter of Mr. George Livensberger, who survives him with two young children--boys--to mourn his untimely end. Mr. Wiseman was born in Bielfeld, Prussia, April 2nd 1842 and at the time of his death was aged 43 years, 6 months and 24 days. In 1864 he, under the instruction of his late brother-in-law, Capt. Alfred Reeder, chose the profession of pilot, which he followed assiduously until recently, and was said to be one of the most competent river men on the Missouri. Lately he abandoned the river and accepted the appointment of special agent of the Springfield F. & M. Insurance company, of Massachusetts, in its Kansas farm department, and by his thorough business tact succeeded in extending its business largely. During the late war he was an officer in Co. A. 22d Ill. Vol. Infy., in which he served 3 years and came home with an honorable record. His funeral took place 2d inst. from the 7th street M. E. church, and his remains were followed to the grave in the city cemetery by a large concourse of mourners.---The Louisiana Press.

## OLD SETTLERS

### Articles of Association of the Old Settlers of Reno county, Kansas

Article I.--This association shall be called The Old Settlers' Association of Reno county, and state of Kansas.

Article II.--The objects of the association are, the cultivation of social relations, to renew acquaintances, and to preserve the history of the county and times.

Article III.--The term for which this association is organized is perpetual.

Article IV.--The officers of the association shall be, a president, and one vice-president from each municipal township in the county, a secretary, treasurer, a historian and an executive committee of five members of which committee the president and secretary shall be members ex-officio.

Article V.--The officers of the association shall be elected at each annual meeting of the association, for a term of one year, except the elective members of the executive committee, and the historian, who shall be elected as follows: The historian shall be elected for a term of three years and the elective members of the executive for a term of three years, provided that on the adoption of these articles of association, one member of said committee shall be chosen for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, and thereafter one member shall be elected for a term of three years.

Article VI.--The duties of such officers shall be such as usually devolve upon them in such organizations, except that it shall be the duty of the several vice-presidents to take an enumeration of all residents of their respective townships that are eligible to membership in this association, and endeavor to organize auxillary township organizations in each township in the county.

Article VII.--All persons who shall have been residents of the county for a period of eighteen years shall be eligible to membership.

Article VIII.--The membership fee shall be fifty cents for men, women admitted free.

Article IX.--The association shall hold an annual reunion, commencing on the first Wednesday of October of each year, at the city of Hutchinson, Kan., under the direction of its officers.

Article X.--The secretary shall preserve all the paper read at each annual meeting, and keep a correct history of the events of each meeting in a book, which shall be the property of the association.

Article XI.--Rules and regulations shall be adopted from time to time for the government of the association as in the wisdom of its members may be necessary.

Article XII.--These articles of association may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

The brides's gown was of white net fashioned over white silk taffeta. She wore a long veil caught in the hair with lillies. Her going away gown was of red broadcloth with hat and gloves to match. The decorations were white clematis, palms and ferns. The bay window was a bank of ferns, where the bridal party stood during the ceremony. White clematis was used in decorating the dining room and the table decorations were roses and astors. White clematis also roped the stairway. An elegant seven-course dinner was served. CHAPTER XXXVIII.

THE CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS IN RENO COUNTY.

In this chapter will be found a complete list of Union soldiers living in Reno county in 1890, when the census was taken, which includes the name of the soldier, his rank, his company and regiment and, with a few exceptions, the state from which he enlisted. This list is remarkable, as it shows the cosmopolitan character of the early settlers of Reno county. Nearly every state in the Union is represented. The Southern states have representatives from nearly every state in the Confederacy, and with few exceptions those from the seceded states were mostly colored soldiers, there being a total of sixteen colored regiments enrolled as troops of the United States during the Civil War.

There is perhaps no other complete list in Reno county of the soldiers of the North. They were among the most active of the old settlers of the county, it being named for a soldier, Major Jesse Lee Reno, who lost his life in the battle of South Mountain. In a former chapter, in order to preserve them, there are six hundred and fifty-nine names of the men and women who signed the petition for organizing the county in 1873, likewise here is recorded the list of the old soldiers who were living in the county in 1890. This list has been taken from the records of the war department at Washington and checked with a similar list on file in the office of the secretary of state of Kansas. It contains ten hundred and thirty-five names, and the number from each state is set down opposite the name of the state, as follows:

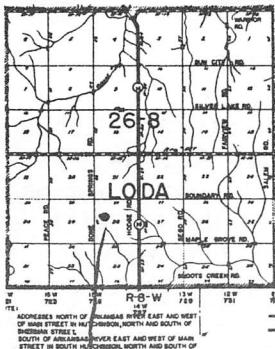

**ENGLAND  
1891 CENSUS**

The 1891 Census for England and Wales is now available on microfiche at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City.

To locate the microfiche number for your locale there are two registers. Use the first one to look up a place name and make a note of the registration district and number. Use the second register to find the microfiche number that corresponds with the registration district number. Each number may include one or more (usually three or four) microfiche cards.

A street index for the major cities in the 1891 Census is also available. However, as of November 1992, it was not yet bound and had to be requested at the British Reference Desk.

NOTE: This set of fiche is not available at the Hutchinson Family History Center. If you want to order the fiche for a parish in England, you can write to the English Reference Desk, Family History Department, 50 East North Temple Street, Salt Lake City UT 84150 for the fiche numbers or the FHC will obtain the numbers and order the fiche.

BETTER THAN JEWELS is divided into two parts. The paternal line begins with Lexie Bridwell Cox 18 February 1892-5 March 1955 and ends with Daniel Milton Bushnell 23 October 1795-4 January 1854 and Minerva Coe 15 May 1801-6 January 1882. The maternal line begins with the wife of Lexie Cox, Katherine Alton Maxwell 17 April 1896-28 February 1979 and goes back to John Syberry 1794-after 1860 and Mary Manuel August 1805-after 1870.

Paternal lines came from CT, OH, VA, KY, IL, KS to OK and maternal lines from MD, PA, OH, KS, to OK.

The names BRIDWELL, BROCKMAN, BUSHNELL, COX, HAMMOND, MAXWELL, MILLER, NUNN, PACKWOOD, SYBERRY\SIBRAY SMITH AND TURNER are included in the index of more than 170 surnames.

This book is not just a recitation of family facts, but puts the family in context with historical events. This book is the result of a lot of research conducted over twelve years. Very interesting reading. RHF
