FAMILY HISTORY CENTER

The latest version of the Ancestral File is now in use at the Family History Center. Twenty-nine million names can be found on seven CD's.

The new update has the new file format, and even has the capability to export to PAF version 3.0 as soon as we get it. You will note that there are now diacritics in Ancestral File. If you have branches you want to download which has diacritics, I suggest you wait for PAF version 3.0 which will support these. If you download in PAF 2.31 format, these characters will be removed. I believe the primary reason for the delay was arriving at a

new file format for PAF, Ancestral File, and the IGI.

There is no official date set for the release of PAF version 3.0. All 2.31 versions have sold out. There will be no PAF shipments until the new version comes out.

TROUBLE TRANSFERRING TO AND FROM FAMILY TREE MAKER

Question: I am using Ancestral Quest with my PAF data files because I like the printouts and Windows view. I have been having trouble with GEDCOM's from Family Tree Maker, the notes don't come out.

Editor's Comment: The reason you are having a problem is that the GEDCOM standards are not the same. When PAF version 3.0 and the simultaneous update to Ancestral Quest is released, this problem should disappear. It is my understanding that the current PAF uses GEDCOM standard version 4.0 and the new standard will be version 5.3. (The above statements were taken from "PAF Users Unlimited", Page 92, Third Quarter 1996, Vol. 8, No. 3, Vance Parker, Editor)

DON'T think that you have tried everything at the Family History Center. There are many new sources available on microfiche and microfilm that can be ordered from the Family History Department or are in the microfiche collection drawers.

INDEX TO PENSION APPLICATION FILES OF REMARRIED WIFOWS BASED ON SERVICE IN THE WAR OF 1812, INDIAN WARS, MEXICAN WAR AND REGULAR ARMY BEFORE 1861. Microfilm Series 1784.

This microfilm is one one roll of Microfilm. It is the index to the pension applications of widows of Soldiers who served in either the War of 1813, the Indian Wars, the Mexican War or served in the Regular Army before 1861 and have remarried.

Each file consists of a 3x5 card with eight (8) cards to a page. They are indexed alphabetically by the current surname of the widow not by the surname of the soldier. Each card is titled Remarried Widow with the particular war the soldier served written or typed beside the title. The categories on each card are Name of Claimant, Name of Soldier, Service, Number of original application, number of Certificate if any, Date of Filing and a remarks section.

ENGLAND—If one's ancestors left England after June 1837, there are indexes available, but up to 1874 about 15% were missed.

There is no easy way to find emigration records since there are 12 departments in England that have associated lists.

WISCONSIN PIONEER OR CENTURY FAMILY CERTIFICATES

The Wisconsin State Genealogical Society issues certificates to persons who are directly descended from Wisconsin Pioneer or Century Ancestors.

Applicants must prove direct descent and prove that the ancestor settled in Wisconsin prior to the year 1851 in the case of Pioneer ancestors, or over 100 years preceding the date of application in the case of Century Ancestors. Applicants may apply for certificates to be issued to themselves or to other persons. The person to whom the certificate is issued need not currently live in Wisconsin.

The purpose of the Pioneer/Century Family Certificate Program is to recognize families with Wisconsin roots, encourage people to undertake genealogical research, develop a database of information for researchers, and to improve the quality of genealogical research.

COPY MACHINE DOCUMENTS

How long will copy machine documents last? This leads to another important question. Is there a method of printing which uses acid free paper that will give the researcher archival quality or is it necessary to use paper especially made for the copier? The answer is, if you make a xerographic copy on a permanent archival quality paper, you have a copy that will last a long time (150 years, if stored at 70° with 50 % humidity). This advice was offered by Kathy Ludwig, Archives Conservator of the Minnesota Historical Society.

The Xerographic image is made of carbon black pigment mixed with a plastic binder that is fused onto the paper with heat. The carbon black is not light sensitive, nor will it dissolve when exposed to water, therefore, it's resistant to fading and washing away if the paper should become wet. If the machine is in good condition and the toner is fused to the paper properly, you should have a relatively permanent copy. This also applies to computer laser printed copies. There are some questions about the uniform stability of computer jet printed

inks. There are many formulations of jet ink, and the formulations constantly change. In the past, some formulations have contained water soluble dyes, which tend to be less light fast and can feather or blur when wet. Contact the manufacturer about the stability of a specific jet printer ink.

EDITORIAL

Why don't you attend the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies Annual Conference and Seminar?

The Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies believes that the genealogists in Kansas deserve the privilege of attending a first rate genealogical seminar. This means booking speakers with eminent genealogical knowledge about their subject. As you have possibly noted, the subjects covered by the speakers have been selected to appeal to the greatest number of genealogists.

The officers, board members and district representatives are trying to keep the location in the central part of the state. Is it because of the location that you don't attend? Wichita was selected because of its accessibility from all parts of the state. The Century II Conference Center is very easy to locate and has excellent parking facilities. I have been able to leave Wichita after the Friday evening dinner which includes a talk by the featured conference speaker while it is still daylight.

I have heard comments about the cost of attending the conference. The building costs, which include two large rooms and four small rooms (seating 50+ people) for Friday afternoon and three large rooms on Saturday plus setting up chairs, tables and electronic equipment is not inexpensive. The catered meals, Friday night and Saturday noon, and the drinks (tea, water and coffee) for breaks between the sessions are also expensive, but the same costs would apply anywhere.

The speakers on Friday afternoon and many people from the Kansas Council are involved in preparing for and presenting the conference and they are not paid.

I have been comparing the costs of "our Kansas Conference" with many over the country and the KCGS Conference expenses are not out of line. March 15th the Clark County (Washington) Gen. Soc. had an all day conference featuring Dr. Alice Eixholz, Ph.D., C. G. from Vermont. The cost of the one day—seminar with lunch—was \$30.00. The 1997 Topeka Genealogical Society Annual Conference featured Sharon DeBartolo Carmack of Simla, CO. They also have Friday afternoon sessions, a Friday evening dinner with a talk by the conference speaker and Saturday lectures and lunch buffet. The cost for each day was \$22.50 with a total cost of \$45.00. The St. Louis Genealogical Society's Annual Fair, one day plus lunch, cost \$29.00.

The KCGS Friday afternoon session with four mini-sessions including the evening dinner is \$30.00. Friday evening dinner with "LADIES OF THE NIGHT - AND OTHER BRIGHT LIGHTS" by Sandra Hargreaves Luebking, FUGA, Speaker only, \$20.00. The Saturday program with four topics and a buffet lunch is \$30.00. If you are going to the Saturday session for just \$13.00 more you can attend the Friday afternoon sessions (four) and the evening dinner with a talk by the featured speaker. The pre-registration fee for both days is \$43.00 (\$21.50 a day) or \$45.00 after June 5, 1997.

There is one way to cut future expenses and to keep the Annual Conference in this part of the state. That is for more people to support the conference by attending both Friday and Saturday sessions. Another way, is to take a car load to Wichita and share the travel expense.

Please do your part in making the 1997 KCGS Annual Conference a success by attending one or both days.

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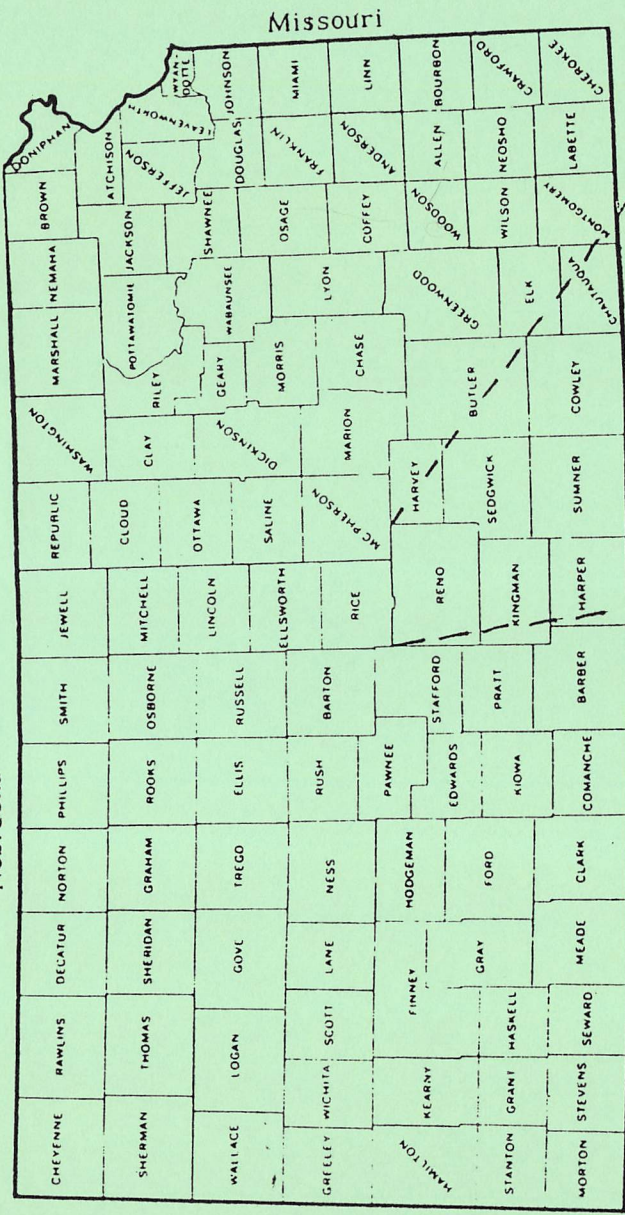
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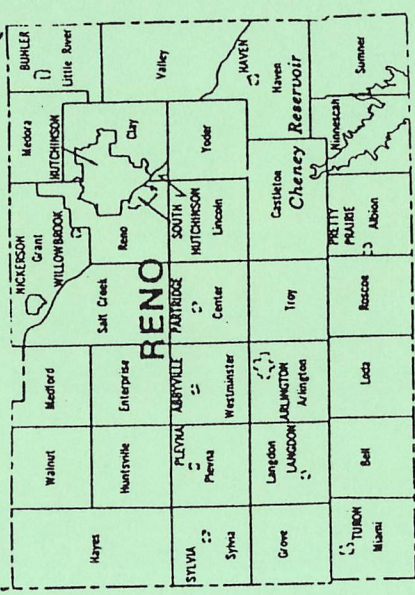
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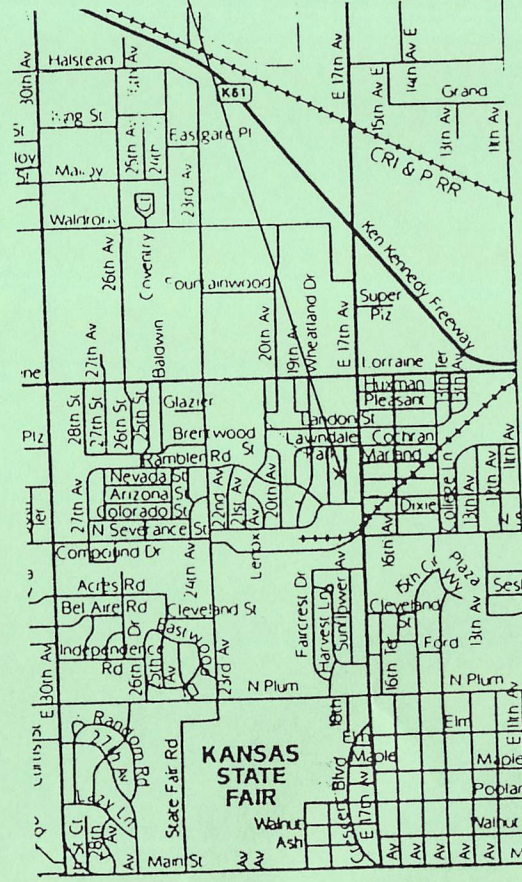
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
