HOW FAR BACK CAN YOU TRACE A TITLE

Some years ago, Eastern interests considered the purchase of some real estate in Louisiana. When the abstract title came through, their attorney called attention to the fact that the title record ran back only to 1803, and communicated with the owners as to the record prior to that date.

In part, this is the answer he received:

"I note your comment upon the fact that the record of title sent to you as applying to the lands under consideration dates only from the year 1803 and your request for an extension of the record prior to that date.

Please be advised the government of the United States acquired the territory of Louisiana, including the tract to which your inquiry applies, by purchase, from the government of France in the year 1803.

The government of Spain acquired title by discovery of one Christopher Columbus, traveler and explorer, a resident of Genoa, Italy, who, by agreement concerning the acquisition of title to any lands discovered, traveled and explored under the sponsorship and patronage of her Majesty, the Queen of Spain.

The Queen of Spain had verified her arrangement and received sanction of her title by consent of the Pope, resident of Rome, Italy, and ex-officio representative and vice-regent on earth of Jesus Christ.

Do you have a place that you can't find on the map? Well it's easy to find if you have GNIS. Or you can find it on the internet. The US Geological Service has a CD with millions of place names throughout the United States. It gives the latitude and longitude of a place name.

The CD is available from USGS-ESIC, 507 National Center, 12201 Sunrise Valley Dr., Reston, VA 22092. Phone 1-800-USA MAPS. The cost is \$57.00 plus \$3.50 s/h by check, money order or credit card.

A scaled down version, that will show the location on a map as well as giving the latitude and longitude is on the internet at: www.usgs.gov then jump to USGS Mapping Information-GNIS Data Base Query Form.

IMMIGRATION & NATURALIZATION

There is a very informative booklet which can be acquired from the United States Immigration & Naturalization Services. The book is "Genealogy Correspondence Resource Guide: and should be ordered from the Immigration Forms Center, Wiliston, Vermont 05405. Refer to Form M-360. It tells you where to find records on everything from ship manifests to head tax certificates, from federal court addresses to what the naturalization requirements were before 1906.

VITAL RECORDS OF ONTARIO CANADA

The Family History Library has filmed the Index Book to the vital records of Ontario. Allowing for significant gaps, especially 1869-1890's because vital events were not always registered, these 26 reels of microfilm cover: births from 1869-1896; marriages from 1873-1911; deaths from 1869-1921. The index contains information as to surname and given name, place of event, exact date of event, year of registration, registration number, later changes to records.

Barbara Jean Evans.

A collection of words, phrases, and abbreviations that genealogists might encounter. It includes medical, legal, geographical, religious, occupational, and some foreign terms. 300 pp.

MARYLANDERS TO KENTUCKY, 1775-1825. Henry C. Peden, Jr.

Taken from a variety of primary and secondary sources, this book is meant to be a locating aid. Thousands of persons listed. 202 pp.

MORE MARYLANDERS TO KENTUCKY, 1778-1828. Henry C. Peden, Jr.

Compiled from many sources: census, probate, tax, land and family records; military pensions, county histories, newspapers, and more. 262 pp.

MARYLANDERS TO CAROLINA: Migration of Marylanders to North Carolina and South Carolina Prior to 1800. Henry C. Peden.

Taken from a variety of sources. Gives biographical information about the families. 225 pp.

EARLY OHIO SETTLERS: Purchasers of Land in East and East Central Ohio, 1800-1840. Compiled by Ellen T. Berry and David A. Berry.

Berry Land records from the Zanesville Land Office, as well as records from the Marietta and Steubenville Land Offices, not previously published. Includes 22,770 persons. 330 pp.

INDEX TO TENNESSEE WILLS AND ADMINISTRATIONS, 1779-1861. Byron and Barbara Sistler.

Over 41,500 entries. Includes all extant Tennessee wills and administrations 409 pp.

TENNESSEANS BEFORE 1800:

Washington County. Compiled by Marjorie Hood Fischer.

This remarkable book is a powerful finding aid for Washington County, listing 72,203 individual entries from records of the county created between 1778 and 1800. Included here is every name in every Washington county record available on microfilm from the Tennessee State Archives.

Records indexed include: inventories, marriages, court minutes (County Court, Superior Court, County Pleas, Circuit Court) administrator's and executor's settlements, wills, deeds, and tax lists. The entries give the name, type of record, book number or other identifying information (i.e. box number, year of tax list, etc.), page number, (or militia unit in the case of tax lists), and the Tennessee State Library microfilm number.

TENNESSEANS BEFORE 1800: Davidson County. Compiled by Marjorie Hood Fischer.

This book is the result of hours of painstaking indexing of all the county records of Davidson County, Tennessee, through 1800. Ca 460 pp.

Marjorie Fischer wanted to construct a "census" of all known inhabitants of Tennessee prior to 1800. By indexing the first records of one of the earliest counties in Tennessee, she has provided a powerful finding aid to locate the records of our ancestors.

Every name in every Davidson County record available on microfilm from the Tennessee State Archives has been indexed here, resulting in a collection of 109,271 entries between 1782 and 1800.

Records indexed include: inventories, marriages, court minutes (County Court, County Pleas, wills, and deeds. The entries give the name, type of record, book number or other identifying information (i.e. box number), page number, and the Tennessee State Library microfilm number.

**** The microfilms of the above two books are available for research at many facilities nationwide, for purchase from the Tennessee State Library, and most are available by loan through the branch library system of the Family History Library in Salt Lake City.****

Reno County Genealogical Society February Board Meeting

The following decisions were made at the RCGS Board Meeting. Membership dues will be raised to \$12.00 beginning January 1, 1999. A late payment fee of \$3.00 will be added to the \$12.00 if the dues are not paid by January 31 of each year.

A budget was presented to the board by Karen Burgess. This budget was finalized after much discussion by committee members Ruth Filbert and Pam Stansel at the budget committee meeting.

INCOME:

Membership \$1300.00; Acquisition Book Fund (Donations) \$50.00; Charts and Sales \$100.00; Research (Donations) \$350.00 Total \$1800.00

EXPENSES:

Charts and Sales (Printing) \$50.00; Quarterly \$1400.00; Research \$50.00; General Operating Budget \$300.00. Total \$1800.00.

There is no budgeted amount for the purchase of books in the budget. Any books purchased will come from the interest paid on Certificates of Deposit and Savings Accounts held by the society. It was suggested that members donate up to one-half of the price of a book they would like to have purchased by the society.

It was decided that the purchase of a Copier for printing *The Sunflower* using money in the Savings Account or in the Certificates of Deposit was not practical at this time, but this is not to say that a purchase of a copier may not be considered in the future.

The quarterly publication is the most expensive portion of the budget. The quarterly costs are higher because the mailing costs have risen (bulk mailing costs - yearly fee and the cost of each mailing); and the printing costs (labor, ink and paper) have about doubled. Since a large portion of the societies membership relies on *The Sunflower* as their main benefit of belonging to RCGS, we are trying not to reduce the number of pages in the publication. The editor is still trying to find a way of lowering the cost.

Considerations are: 1. Gathering a group of people to col-

late, staple and label each issue in preparation for mailing. 2. Using a white cover of average weight instead of the green index paper now used. 3. Using 8 1/2" x 11" sheets of paper (see last issue) instead of the 11" x 17" normally used. 4. Cutting the number of pages in each issue. 5. Seeing if any stores in Wichita would do the job cheaper. Questions: Who would take the copies to Wichita and pick up them up? Do we want to take our business out of Hutchinson.

The treasurer is to consider the rate of interest offered by different banking or credit facilities whenever a Certificate of Deposit is renewed. The treasurer, Pam Stansel, would like to consolidate all of the accounts at one institution, if possible.

A volunteer is needed to set at a table displaying books and etc. at the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies Annual Meeting in Wichita in June. The books offered for sale by the society and the quarterlies that are left over after each mailing are of no use to anyone stored in boxes. We need to sell them.

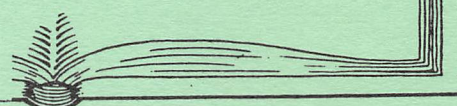
