At <<http://www.topozone.com/>> there are exceptionally good color topographical maps of the United States [Alaska and Puerto Rico coming soon] at scales of 1:200000, 1:100000, 1:50000 and 1:25000. These not only show topographical features and towns, roads, etc., but also the township-range numbers and section numbers as well as the political township names. At 1:25000, you can see individual houses, and finding “the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 23 of township 40 north, range 5 east” becomes trivial. Even the people in “metes and bounds” states [Beginning at the white oak....”] should be able to get a pretty good idea of where their ancestors’ land was. You want to find the general area you need at 1:200000, then center it (by clicking on the map), go to 1:100000 (it will keep the same center, then do that again at 1:50000 and 1:25000. This is a great resource.

(The above two items were sent to me and I do not know the original source. If anyone knows the original source, I will give them full credit for the information.)

#### The 1841 Census of Cambridgeshire

The Public Record Office (PRO) has re-filmed much of the 1841 census, as the enumeration's were made in pencil and the first filming is often illegible. This has made a big difference for Cambridgeshire and the Isle of Ely. The new film is in the Family Records Centre in London, and the Cambridge County Record Office. It is not known whether the Family History Library in Salt Lake City will obtain copies of the new 1841 Census Films.

#### Virginia Inheritance Laws

Prior to 1786, a will in Virginia did not have to name the wife or the eldest son. Their inheritance of real estate was set by law; the widow receiving her one-third dower and the eldest son receiving the remaining two-thirds, unless otherwise specified in the father's will. The eldest son also received his mother's share if she died.

If the eldest son had died, the eldest grandson of the whole blood became the heir-at-law, not the second son. If a man was unmarried, his heir-at-law was his eldest brother, never his father or his uncle.

#### Collateral Obituaries

It's always a good idea to check obituaries of collateral relatives. Even though your direct ancestor's obituary does not contain much information, it is possible that relatives' obituaries do have data that could prove invaluable. If you know the date of death of an aunt or cousin, for example, you can request microfilm copies of local newspapers through interlibrary loan. Scan the entire paper because articles may appear in any local section. The old papers usually are only four or six pages long, and are always interesting.

Do you know that the Missouri State Genealogical Association and the American Family Records Association support the circulating collection (of genealogy books)? Mo SGA added \$5000 worth of books to the circulating collection in 1999, and many others were donated in 1999.

## ARE YOU PROTECTING YOUR TREASURES

I am not a "scrapbooker", but I do look at the magazines that show you how to put everything in an album using some of the fancy papers, clip-art and stickers that are available.

I keep thinking that someday, I will dig out all of those pictures that are stored in boxes, the old documents that are in the safe deposit box, the newspaper clippings and the photocopies of the documents that supporting my family history research and preserve them for future generations.

There are many products available to the family historian to help us complete our task.

Several products have been developed to protect documents from harmful paper acids. They can be sprayed from an aerosol can or refillable spray bottle. Spraying documents makes the paper acid-free and keeps it from becoming brittle with time. It is said to be safe for all paper and inks.

There are non-acidic glue sticks that are either permanent or those that remain tacky so that you can arrange items before attaching them permanently or PH-neutral glue in pen format that can be used bonding fabric or paper. There is an acid-free double stick adhesive tape that will permanently bond to most surfaces. Another new product is memorabilia pockets. They are available in jumbo size or in small - 2" x 2"; medium 2" x 4 1/8" and large 3 1/2" x 4 1/8" sizes. The pockets are acid free and archival-safe and they are self-adhesive. Articles can be carefully removed for viewing and replaced.

The best way to preserve and protect paper keepsakes is encapsulation. It prevents any of the normal deterioration caused by handling, moisture, and migration.

To encapsulate a document.

- Spray the document to be encapsulated with a deacidification spray.
- Cut two pieces of Mylar "Type D" polyester film larger than the document to be encased.
- Lay the document on the polyester film.
- Place strips of "Scotchpar" double-coated film tape 1/8" from the edges of the document being careful not to overlap the tape at the corners.
- Cover with the 2nd piece of film and press firmly around the edge to seal.
- Trim the edge of the polyester film beyond the edge of the tape. Round the corners.

Take advantage of the many archival storage boxes, protective folders and bags and notebook sheet protectors.

There is no excuse for letting our keepsakes deteriorate because we can't find time to make an album. Our descendants will appreciate our thoughtfulness.

Check the scrapbook aisle the next time you are in a hobby store, purchase several "Scrapbook" magazines or order one of the many catalogs that specialize in archival products to learn more about preserving your treasures.

### Preservation

Preservation as defined for use in the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies Awards Program, is the treatment given any data of historical and/or genealogical import in any format to ensure its availability and usability. Availability includes the protection of materials in the original form, i.e., archival treatment, storage, etc., or the conversion of the data to another format. Usability involves making such materials publicly accessible in the original, such as in libraries or online and/or abstracting and indexing those materials to enhance use.

### Photocopies of Pictures

Use a color copier to photocopy black and white photos. Color copiers register 254+ shades of gray, black and white copiers register about 16.

### Magnetic Albums

To remove a stuck photograph from a magnetic album, lift a corner and aim a blast of hot air from a hair dryer underneath the photo. The picture will then separate from the page. **Do not use a heat gun.** The extreme temperature will ruin the photo.

### Old Newspapers

To preserve old newspapers, unfold them carefully and spray with deacidification spray. This can help relax the pages and remove some of the yellowing. Next, store the newspapers flat in an acid free, newspaper size box.

## ORGANIZATION

There are four excellent articles in "Heritage Quest" magazine with valuable information on organizing your genealogy.

**Sharon DeBartolo Carmack**, in "Painless Organization", page 8, discusses filing systems, filing tips, the key to your filing system and making it work, your research notebook, using a laptop, and where to put all your genealogy stuff.

**William Dollarhide**, in "Solving the Paper-Collecting Problem", page 12, contributes an excellent article on how to sort out all your piles and categorize your material into three categories which you can handle from then on.

**Dawn Slater-Putt**, in the article "Organizing Genealogical Materials", page 24, presents her ideas on methods of organization which is followed by actual getting organized. Her ideas are very practical.

**Donna Potter Phillips**, page 42, has fun with her article on "How NOT To Be An Organized Genealogist" which can be reversed to know "How To."

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Puterbaugh, of McAlester, Ok., who was taken sick while visiting in Hutchinson at the home of Senator Emerson Carey, is reported to be improving and able to be around again.

According to reports received of the county health officer there is an epidemic of typhoid fever at Sylvia. The ten year old daughter of Dr. J. W. Yankey died a few days ago and now both of her parents are in serious condition from typhoid.

Prior to 1752, the first day of the year was not January 1, but March 25. So when you are researching and have a date of 7 Feb 1714 this would actually be 7 Feb 1715. All dates from January 1 through March 24 would be the old

year. You can write the date February 1714/15. This is the way you will find it entered in most books, except early court records, the original records.

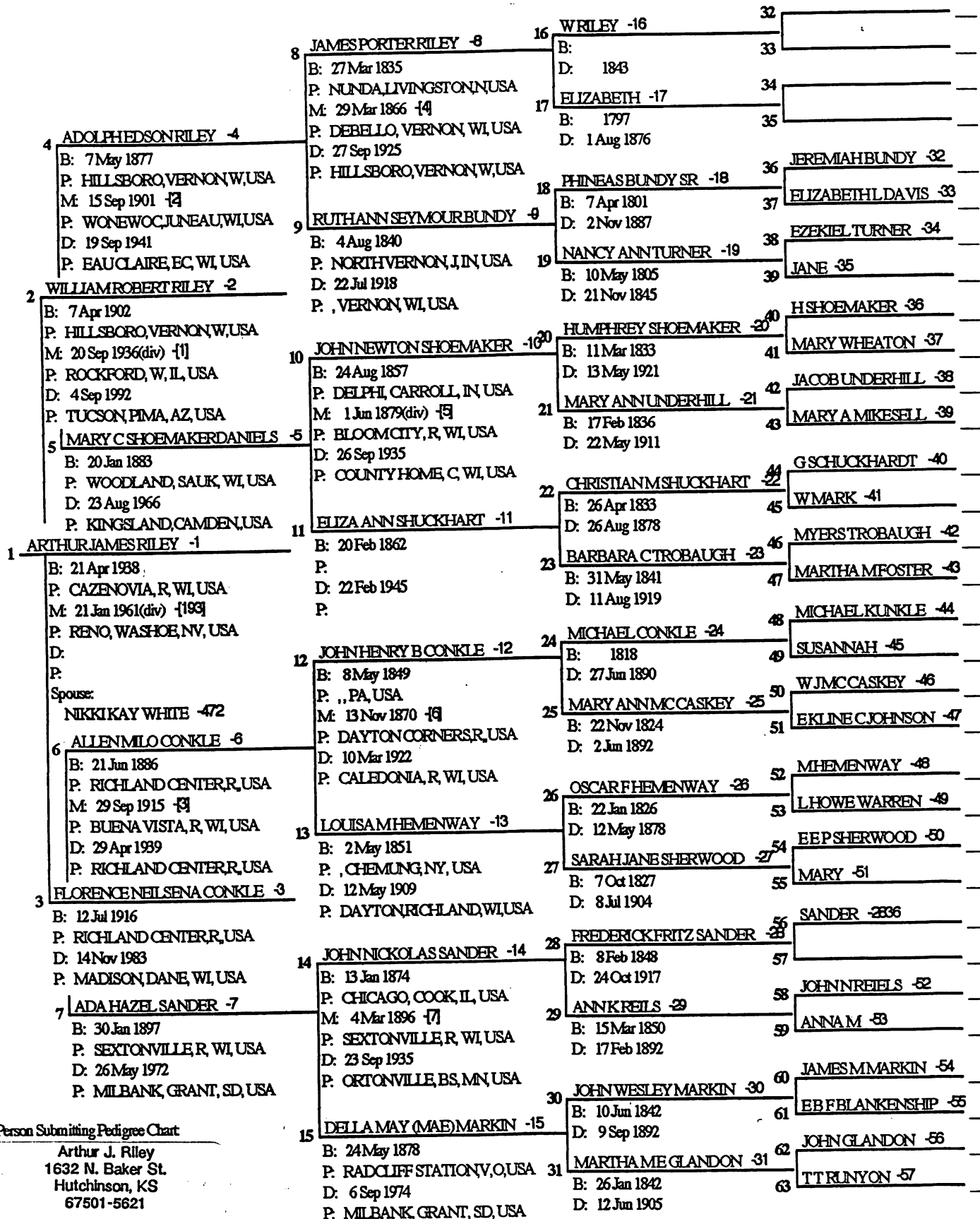

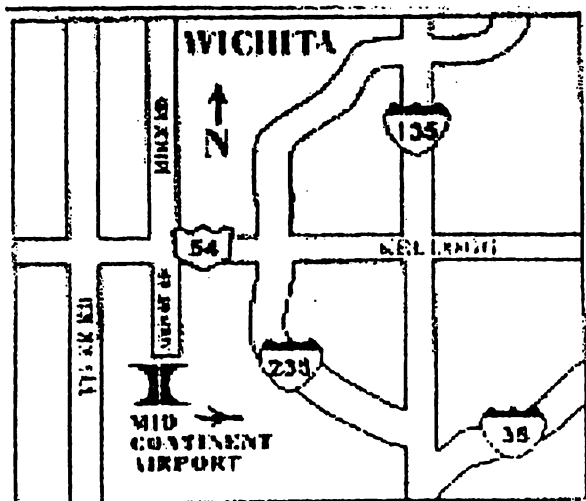
