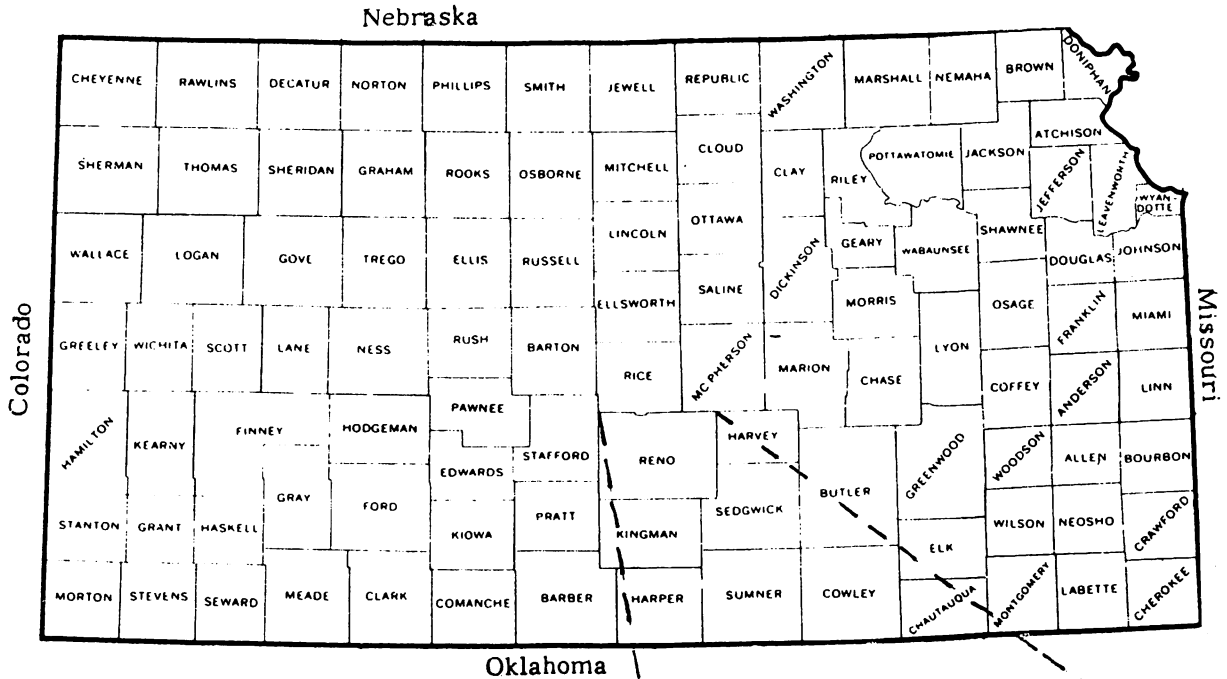

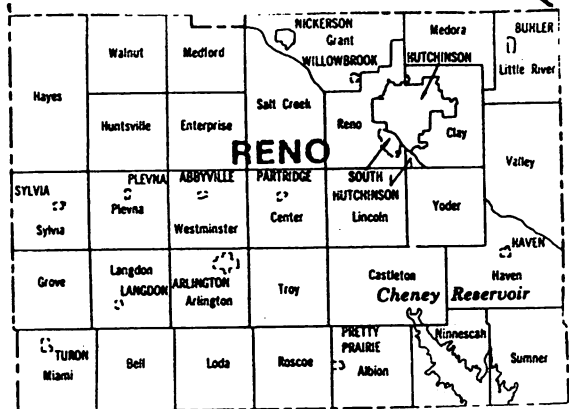

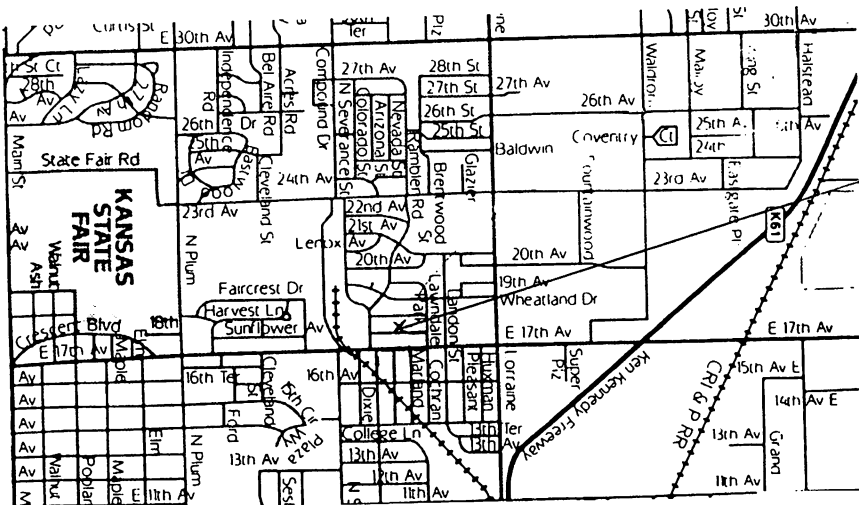

ENEMY ALIEN REGISTRATION AFFIDAVITS, 1917-1918

(From Records of United States Attorneys & Marshals, District of Kansas: National Archives Record Group 118)

Following the onset of hostilities during World War I, non-naturalized "Enemy Aliens" were required to register with United States authorities as a national security measure. The provisions of a Presidential Proclamation of April 6, 1917, included those women of American birth who were married to so-called enemy aliens. Registrants included school children, divinity students, former United States soldiers and sailors, Roman Catholic nuns, the elderly, and the infirm. The series contains original affidavits of registration that record personal information about each registrant, fingerprints, and a photograph, in most cases.

This index was compiled largely from handwritten originals by the National Archives-Central Plains Region Volunteers who apologize for any transcription or typographical errors that may exist.

The above Alien Registrations for Kansas have been abstracted by Ruth Bennett Sanderson and are being published in the *Kansas Review*, quarterly publication of the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies. Several counties are being published in each quarterly. The alien registrations for Reno County can be found in Volume 24, No. 4, Page 104.

BOOKLET

Births, Deaths, Marriages and Divorces is an inexpensive booklet published by the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services. It lists the name and address of each state's vital records agency, the current cost of ordering a record from that state, and the dates for which these records are available.

LEST WE FORGET

Have you looked at the following records for your ancestors?

- * Personal papers, such as dairies, letters, scrapbooks, autograph books, Christmas and birthday cards and Bibles
- * School records, such as report cards, reports kept by the school district, diplomas, awards or activities
- * Military papers, such as registration cards, discharge records, the Military Death Records of the Vietnam and Korean War veterans on CD at the Family History Center
- * Newspaper clipping recording births, obituaries, announcement of engagements, marriage, military service and school activities
- * Court documents, such as deeds, tax records, court actions, marriage/divorce papers, etc.
- * Church records for baptism, confirmation, births, death, marriage, burial records
- * Family photographs (look on the back of the picture for written information)

QUAKER RECORDS

Index of Mansfield Entries in Local Quaker Registers to 1837. With additional information on Sufferings, to 1798. An abstract by David J. Bradbury.

The index lists all people born, married, died or buried at Mansfield from the composite registers for Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire compiled from original records after national civil registration was introduced in 1837.

Two members of the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies, Ruth Filbert, Vice President of KCGS and Karen Burgess, KCGS District 8 Representative, attended the KCGS fall meeting in Newton, Saturday, November 4.

The Topeka Genealogical Society and the Kansas Council of Genealogical Societies will present a joint conference in Topeka June 29-30, 2001 at the Maner Conference Center with the Capitol Plaza (which has enclosed walkways to the Conference Center) as the suggested hotel. A block of thirty rooms have been reserved for the conference at a price of \$82.00 per day. Karen and I intend to go to Topeka on Thursday. Won't you plan to join us.

Ruth Filbert and Joan Page, from Manhattan, Mini-workshop chairmen and Lee Kensett, KCGS President, met with Pat Thomas and Coleen Wilson from Topeka to work out the details for the conference.

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Code: Membership number. This refers to the letter and number that members are given when they join the Reno County Genealogical Society. F 1 & 2 refers to Edward and Ruth Filbert. They were the first and second members to join with a surname beginning with "F". When the membership list is printed in the May issue of *The Sunflower*, you will find the members name, address and membership number. If the member has joined after the May issue was printed, the full name and address of the submitter is printed on that page or on the preceding page.

Name: This column lists the surname and given name of the person being researched.

Birth: This column is for the birth year and county and state or country of the person being researched.

Marriage: This column lists the year and county and state or country where the person was married.

Death: This column lists the year and county and state or country where the person died.

Residence: Did the person live several other places between the birth, marriage and death information already given? Such as: the years and places children were born as a family moved west. Did the person live for a time in another county or country that is not shown by the above information? Would this information be of interest to someone researching your family surname?

The information that you give may help others researching your family surname connect with your family or they may be able to help you fill in the blanks that you have. A "?" can be inserted if only partial or no information for a column is known.
