Ringgold Band 1885-1886

Shared by RCGS members, Robert Martin & Melody Morgan

Joseph Alexander Martin married Orpha Eudora Wohlfort 11/18/1888 in Hutchinson, KS. He is shown on the cover photo in the center [with the check mark]. Joseph is the grandfather of Robert Martin. Joseph's sister, Sarah Martin Morgan Yoder, is the great-grandmother of RCGS member, Melody Morgan. Joseph and Sarah are the children of Alfred Desire Martin and Mary McKenna.



Fifty-six colored men from Reno County responded to Uncle Sam's call and took up arms for the defense of the country.

Chester I. Lewis was the first colored man to be drawn for the draft. Chester served as Sergeant, Headquarters Detachment, 92nd Division. He served in France June 19, 1918 to February 8, 1919. He served in St. Die sector in Vosges August and September; Marbache sector in October and offensive operations of Second Army in November.

Chester was the Editor of The Hutchinson Blade. He was born 5/21/1894 in Hutchinson. He died 2/23/1952 and was buried at Eastside Cemetery in lot 842A

Chester's brother, Claude Preston Lewis, served as Sergeant in Company E, 803rd Pioneers. He saw service in Argonne-Meuse. Claude was a mail carrier at the time of his draft registration.

Membership Renewal

Membership requests received after August are applied to the following year and a complimentary November quarterly is mailed. It costs less to provide one complimentary issue than mail the new member packet with all back-issues.

White Bronze Monuments

The Monumental Bronze Company in Bridgeport, CT and its subsidiaries manufactured White Bronze Monuments. The product is actually pure zinc and it is said the term white bronze was used to make the product sound more appealing.

The listing in New York's Great Industries, Its Merchants and Manufacturers, published in 1884, describes the monuments as "...second to no other of its class, and may justly claim to combine the richest embellishments of art with unsurpassed workmanship. The perfection now attained in this direction by the monuments and statuary of the company cast in white bronze, which is zinc refined and made pure as silver, then superbly finished and frosted by the sand-blast and oxidized, is such that they present a beautiful silver-gray color, remaining unchanged for ages".

The company made monuments from 1874 to 1914. The government took over the plant for the manufacturing of munitions during World War I. After the war the demand for the monuments had faded, and the company was dissolved in 1939.

Subsidiaries were established throughout the U.S. in an attempt to expand their business. The first was opened in Detroit in 1881. Detroit Bronze operated until about 1885. In 1886 subsidiaries were opened in Chicago and in Des Moines. American Bronze operated in Chicago until 1909 and Western White Bronze Company in Des Moines, IA until 1908. These locations did not do the original casting, but acted as finishing stations for the monuments. All the original casting took place in Bridgeport Connecticut.

Not all of the monuments are marked but some found in Reno County were provided by the subsidiary Western White Bronze Company, Des Moines, IA. Too bad the company went out of business. Most I have found are in wonderful condition and those with damage is likely due to mowers and maintenance of the cemetery.













Importance of Cemetery Photo Project

These photos best explain the need and urgency for us to record our cemeteries through photography. Photo 1 was taken in December 2005; photo 2 in December 2006 and photo 3 in October 2008. I have been to this grave several times hoping to better identify the person. I believe this grave to be one of the earlier burials in Eastside, for which there are no records. I've seen it in different seasons and different light and the photo I snapped in 2005 captures the information the best. Digital cameras are much more affordable these days. The next time you have the opportunity to preserve family headstones through photography do so, because time may erase the only known record, on the face of the stone.



He was born sixty three years ago in Pennsylvania and had lived in Kansas eighteen years. He enlisted in Company K. Eighteenth Ohio and fought during the Civil War with this regiment. He was a member of Joe Hooker Post and the old soldiers will have charge of the funeral ceremonies, which will beheld at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. He leaves one son, Samuel Welliver Jr. who lives on Bigger Street West in this city.

U. G. Williams Dead

Very Early Settler of Reno County Died This Morning

U. G. Williams died at his home in Lincoln township early this morning, after an illness of about two weeks. He had recently suffered a stroke of paralysis and again later of apoplexy. The death occurred at 10:20 o'clock this morning. Mr. Williams was born about eighty years ago in Wyoming County, PA., and had come to Kansas in the fall of 1872. He settled on a claim in Haven township, but four years ago bought the home in Lincoln township where he died. He was a member of the Twenty Eight Illinois Infantry, during the Civil War. He was also a member of the Elmer M. E. Church, where the funeral services will be held. The sermon being preached by Rev. W. J. Shull. He leaves his wife and three sons. The funeral will be at 10:00 o'clock on Sunday morning; the burial being in Laurel Cemetery. About four years ago Mr. Williams lived for a short time in Hutchinson. Besides that he has lived ever since he came to Kansas, near where he died in Lincoln township. He was well known over the county and was loved by all who knew him. He had been a subscriber of the News for more than thirty years.

Child Choked On Chicken Bone In His Wind Pipe

Carr Witherow, Three Years of Age Met Death in Peculiar Manner

When Carr Witherow, three years of age, awoke from his nap late yesterday afternoon, he was hungry, so his mother gave him a chicken bone to suck. A bit of the bone lodged in the boy's windpipe and before a doctor could be reached he choked to death. Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Witherow live in the country six miles east of Hutchinson. As soon as the boy's plight was discovered, Dr. Forney was summoned by telephone but he did not arrive in time to see the boy alive. The boy had been taken to the home of a neighbor in hope that his life might be saved. The funeral of Carr Witherow was held from home at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Rev. W. B. Stevens preached the funeral service. The burial took place in the Eastside Cemetery.


